About High School Courses at Eluminatus

Eagle's Nest Eluminatus of Newnan is a non-traditional education center accredited fully through the Georgia Accrediting Commission (<http://gac.coe.uga.edu/member-schools/>). Eluminatus was established by homeschool families to support homeschooling parents' role in educating their high school children. The goal of Eluminatus is to connect outstanding, credentialed tutors with parents where additional help is desired, in a caring Christian environment.

Each course qualifies for core or elective credit towards the Georgia high school graduation requirement unless stated otherwise in the description. Courses are taught at a college-prep level. Each course is for the length of the entire school year unless noted otherwise. Students may register for one course or for multiple core or elective courses.

The parent is the teacher! Students should plan to spend at least one hour per day, per class, on their coursework outside of the scheduled class time with parents checking to see that work is completed correctly. It is the responsibility of parents to be sure their student is understanding all concepts. Parents are ultimately responsible for their student's grades and records per the Georgia Department of Education's Declaration of Intent to Homeschool.

About Middle School Courses at Eluminatus

Eluminatus also offers assistance to homeschooling parents to educate their MIDDLE SCHOOL children. Our goal is to work alongside parents where additional help is desired in a caring Christian environment.

We offer a variety of courses for middle school students (grades 6-8) along with a few courses for upper elementary students. **The parent is the teacher**, with Eluminatus tutors providing support. The tutor sets the pace of the course and gives assignments. **The parent helps the student work through daily assignments at home.**

Students can expect to spend approximately one hour per day on homework during the week for each class. Grades are issued by the tutor; however, parents are ultimately responsible for their student's grades and records per the Georgia Department of Education's Declaration of Intent to Homeschool.

Please read the information on the following pages before registering to be sure that Eluminatus is a good fit for your family.

ENCHEA Membership

Eluminatus is part of Eagle's Nest Christian Home Educator's Association (ENCHEA), which offers a variety of programs and activities for homeschooling families. To participate in Eluminatus, ENCHEA membership is required.

ENCHEA online membership applications will open in June. Please be sure to submit your ENCHEA application at that time. Your student's enrollment in Eluminatus classes is contingent upon your membership application being submitted and approved by the ENCHEA Board of Directors.

Enrollment

Enrollment is open from March 1st to July 15th, 2022.

- Early Enrollment: March 1st to June 30th -- \$60 fee per family
- Late Enrollment: July 1st to July 15th -- \$75 fee per family

Registration closes on July 15th, 2022. The course descriptions, tuition, and enrollment forms are available online. The enrollment form must be mailed with your enrollment fee. Space is limited.

Orientation and Financial Commitment

Orientation is mandatory! There are no exceptions, so please make arrangements to be at orientation. **All students and at least one parent are required to attend an orientation meeting and sign the Statement of Cooperation.** This is the agreement to abide by the Information, Conduct (student handbook), and Church Policy, located on www.encea.com under the Academics tab for Eluminatus.

**Orientation meetings will be held on Monday, June 20th at 7 pm and Saturday, July 9th at 10 am at Crossroads Church (2564 GA Hwy. 154, Newnan)*

Financial commitment forms are signed at Orientation. We want you to be fully informed as you sign your financial commitment.

Tuition

The first tuition payment is due August 1st. If classes are dropped due to low enrollment, your fees will be refunded. Once classes begin, you are committed for one semester at a time.

Dropping classes:

To drop classes, you must notify the program director, the tutor, and the ENCHEA treasurer.

If you drop classes after **July 15th**, you must still pay the Materials/Lab fees.

If you drop classes after **August 1st**, you are still required to pay the first semester's tuition in full.

The deadline to drop classes for the second semester is **November 10th**. If you drop classes after November 10th, you are still required to pay the remaining tuition for both semesters in full.

Materials/Lab Fees

Fees for materials and labs are due July 15th. These non-refundable fees are paid directly to the tutors so they can obtain the materials needed for their classes. **If you drop a class after July 15th, you must still pay the materials/lab fees in full!** Tutors will contact you via email with their address. If you are not contacted, do not worry! Just bring your fee with you to the first day of class.

Weekly Classes

Classes meet weekly on Thursdays from August 11, 2022 to May 11, 2023 for Lecture and Lab. (Monday classes start on August 8 and end on May 8.) Students are to complete all work at home to be ready for class each week. ENCHEA and tutors reserve the right to dismiss students for lack of attendance, non-completion of assignments, or unacceptable conduct.

Parent Service Requirement

All parents are required to serve a few times a year on Parent Squad to support the program directors. The goal of Parent Squad is to keep the students safe and to make sure they observe the behavior guidelines and the church policies. A signnugenius.com list will be set up for you to choose the dates you want to serve. Parents are responsible for finding their own subs from among other Eagle's Nest families if unable to serve on their assigned days.

We take our students' safety seriously; failing to arrange for a sub or simply not showing up is considered a breach of the Statement of Cooperation and will result in a \$50 fine.

Grades and Transcripts

As homeschool parents, per your Declaration of Intent to Homeschool, you are responsible for your student's grades. The tutors you hire through ENCHEMA will issue grades to you, the parent, and you will need to retain them. Tutors will make grades available upon request, via returned work, via the online grading system, or by email. ENCHEMA requires a tutor to make grades available to you at least quarterly and at the end of each semester. We do not retain grades or transcripts within ENCHEMA Eluminatus.

If you choose to use a transcription service other than Eluminatus for your high school student, you will forward grade reports to the service.

Official High School Transcripts may be obtained for an additional fee and with a signed annual agreement.

Jennifer Switzer is the Eluminatus of Newnan GAC Center Manager, providing an accredited track through the Georgia Accrediting Commission. She provides transcript support as a school guidance counselor would. Her information and directions are available on our website. Parents may choose to compile their student's own transcripts on an independent track.

*This year, transcription services will begin transitioning to Kate Walker. Students who have already started a transcript with Mrs. Switzer will continue to work with her, while new transcripts will be started with Mrs. Walker

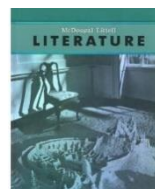

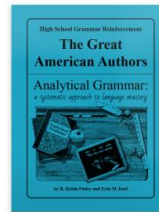
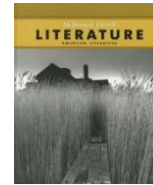
Middle School Language Arts 8

Grade level/age: 8 th grade

Course Description: This course encourages growth in reading, writing and critical thinking skills for both reluctant and advanced readers. It will be a systematic process of daily accomplishments that will lead your student to a more mature level of understanding of the written word. Through reading, analyzing, writing, and correcting, your student will develop skills that will get them ready for high school. Students will script a variety of essays including research. Grammar will be taught in class and applied at home. We will analyze an assortment of stories and novels that will inspire your child. Students should expect 1-1.5 hours of daily homework. There will be an honors option for students who are interested.

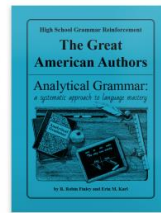
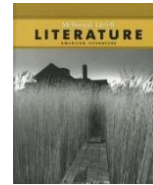
9th Grade Grammar and Composition		
Instructor: Mrs. Michele Bradfield	1.5-hour class	1 credit: Language Arts
Number of students: 5 minimum		
Grade level/age: 9 th and 10 th grade; advanced 8 th grade students with instructor approval		
Prerequisites/skills needed: Must have basic grammar knowledge (parts of speech, basic sentence parts). If the student does not have this knowledge, he or she will struggle in class. Summer remediation is suggested for this.		
<p>Course Description: This course will introduce the writing, reading, and grammar skills needed for academic success in high school. The student will be introduced to all facets of the writing process: organizing information, constructing an effective thesis statement, using MLA format, editing the final product, and presenting work through public speaking. Students will explore persuasive, expository, compare/contrast writing, and poetry annotation. Opportunities provided for creative writing. The class will read literature to develop literary analysis skills. Grammar skills will be reviewed to enhance writing. Students should expect to spend 1.5 hours daily on assignments and reading. Additionally, summer reading assignments are offered. This required course will provide one Carnegie unit of credit towards the English/Language Arts graduation requirement.</p> <p><i>Prior to the beginning of the school year, a summer reading assignment will be sent out.</i></p>

We will study great authors like Homer, Virgil, Shakespeare, Dante, Cervantes, and Hugo. Students will learn to write essays on the books we read and discuss.</p> <p>*This course alternates years with British Literature.</p>

Prerequisites/skills needed: Successful completion of at least 1 year of high school English		
<p>Course Description: This class will enhance your student's ability to use a literary lens and analyze American novels, short stories, poems, and plays. Students will learn to improve various essays using MLA format and will continue to review grammar by analyzing sentences about America's great authors. Assignments will emphasize skills that will assist them in future college level courses. My goal is to encourage your child to have an appreciation for American Literature while increasing their ability in reading, writing, speaking, listening, and language study. Students should expect to spend 1.5 hours daily on assignments and reading and will need the use of a computer and internet for assignments. This required course will provide one unit of credit towards the English/Language Arts graduation requirement.</p>

Grade level/age: 10 th -12 th grade		
Prerequisites/skills needed: Successful completion of at least 1 year of high school English		
Course Description: This class will take your student to the next level by analyzing several American novels, short stories, poems, and plays that often deal with mature themes that reflect the turbulence of the times. Assignments will include research papers, annotated bibliographies, and PowerPoints. Students will write essays demonstrating comprehension of plot and literary period relevance, author intent, and author's use of literary techniques. Daily assignments should take around 1.5 hours. This required course will provide one unit of credit towards the English/Language Arts graduation requirement. Students should be familiar with correctly citing sources and MLA format.



Grade level/age: Grades 6-8	
Prerequisites/skills needed: None	
<p>Course Description: Welcome to Spanish Basics. With this exciting program, your students do more than just learn Spanish. They will live it—and love it— and so will you! The four major language skills—listening, speaking, reading, and writing—are supported with abundant opportunities for practicing Spanish in real-life situations. The secular colleges are not the problem. The issue seems to be that our young people do not truly know what they believe and why they should believe it. This course is designed to teach the students the purpose of the Bible, which is the revelation of Himself. The students will learn the process of how God gave His word to us. They will be challenged to take the Bible and defend what they believe. This course cannot cover all topics that deal with Apologetics or the defending of our Faith; but the purpose of this course is to give them foundational principles that may prepare the students for further learning and education. The students will see how Jesus Christ is pictured or seen in each book of the Old Testament.
